## Roger Bacon And Reid Make Music Together

ROGER BACON Band, beat into shape by rugged band camp and twice daily summer rehearsals, and Bengal linebacker Mike Reid, primed as a concert pianist by his musical training at Pennsylvania State University, will combine efforts in two concerts for the Clifton Music Club Sunday, February 27.

Response to the 3 p.m., concert next Sunday at the McAuley High School auditorium was so immediate that the club has scheduled a repeat performance for 7:30 p.m.

Billed as "the only concert pianist in the football world," Reid plans an informal conversation with the audience in addition to playing piano and singing.

The 110 members of the Roger Bacon Band have twice taken first prize at the Ohio State Fair Marching Band Contest, won the Parade of Champions competition in Philadelphia, which resulted in invitations to play in Europe, and won second place in St. Petersburg, Fla., Festival of States.

THE ORIGINS of both acts are rooted in hard work and a few sheepish moments.

Reid recalls the months between college terms when, instead of playing with the Cincinnati and San Antonio Sympony Orchestras and appearing on "Today," Mery Griffin's, and Dick Cavett's Shows, he was touring small Pennsylvania towns. His only request was that the piano provided for him was "some kind of a grand".

His most unforgettable piano was an old white upright with carved lions' heads in Rinova, Pa. (population 3000). When he discovered that the keys were inoperable and that the piano was badly in need of tuning, the work man's shocked reply was "we just had that thing painted."

Father Celsus, giving the background of the band of which he is moderator, explained that when the boys are recruited in eighth grade, most have no prior musical experience. Of the 125 who are usually recruited annually, only 35 survive the band's summer camp routine of rising at 7 a.m. for exercises and a full day of practice.
