Gilligan Becomes Governor

COLUMBUS (UPI) - Right on schedule, John Joyce Gilligan emerged from the statehouse, accompanied by members of his family and outgoing Gov. James A. Rhodes, to be sworn in as Ohio's 62nd governor. It was 11:30 a.m.

The crowd, estimated by Col. Robert Chairamonte, head of the state Highway Patrol, to be in the neighborhood of 8,000, had started gathering about 10 a.m. in the near freezing temperatures.

The Cincinnati Roger Bacon High School band, which won top honors in last fall's State Fair marching contest, entertained the early arrivers with some stirring music and the Ohio Youth Choir performed.

For the first time in eight years, Democrats were in the majority with state and national political figures occupying most of the choice seats on the speaker's platform.

Among those in the select spots were the four state officials who were also sworn in Monday, They included Republican John Brown, re - elected lieutenant governor, Democratic Attorney General William Brown, Democratic Treasurer Gertrude Donahey and Republican Secretary of State Ted Brown, who was also re-elected.

From Ohio's Democratic Congressional delegation there were Reps. Wayne Hays, Charles Carney, James Stanton, Louis Stokes, John Seiberling and Charles Vanik.

Also in attendance were retired U. S. Sen. Stephen Young, who earlier had sworn in Mrs. Donahey, and unsuccessful Democtatic hopefuls for the U.S. Senate John Glenn and Howard Metzenbaum.
